### **Civic Heart Community Services**

- 1. Community-based social service organization located in the Third ward, Houston, TX.
- 2. Over thirty-four years of working with marginalized and disadvantaged communities.
- 3. Holistic approach with a range of programs and services, including: Housing, HIV Outreach, prevention, Teen pregnancy prevention, Substance misuse prevention, Access to Health Care Coverage, Self-sufficiency employment, Youth Justice programs, Mentoring, and the Northern Third Ward Implementation project
- 4. In 59 Counties throughout Texas
- 5. Diverse workforce with over 75 employees in 25 programs
- 6. History of capacity building programs with small grassroots organizations
- 7. History of providing culturally and trauma informed programs

# Background and Goals

Partnership between Harris County Office of Justice and Safety (OJS) & Harris County Juvenile Probation Department (HCJPD)

- 1. Identify best investments to address racial and ethnic disparities and reduce Disproportionate Minority Contact in the Juvenile Justice system
- 2. Designed to enhance and promote community-based programming
- 3. Reduce juvenile justice involvement for youth
- 4. Culturally responsive prevention and intervention services
- 5. Direct investments in home grown, grassroots community-based organizations

# Youth Reinvestment Fund History

- The Youth Reinvestment Fund (2 million per year) presented by the Harris County Office of Justice and Safety and Juvenile Probation Department was unanimously approved by Commissioners Court in February of 2021.
- In April 2022, the Commissioners Court unanimously approved Civic Heart to be the Intermediary/ Backbone organization for this project from 2022 to 2024.
- •The Reinvestment Fund was created to create community supports and programs in neighborhoods impacted by juvenile justice referrals

# Intermediary Organization & Functions


- Engage directly with impacted communities

### Youth and family serving organizations that serve youth 5-18 years of age at risk:

Examples (not limited to):

- Living below 200% of FPL
- Youth involved in the justice system
- Victims of child abuse/neglect, domestic violence
- Lack of parental support
- Youth who are experiencing homelessness
- Mental or behavioral health services need
- Youth in need of supervision

# Selection of Organizations

- CHCS engaged in gap analysis to identify areas with high referrals and less services
- Used HCJPD data to pinpoint areas with the highest needs on an ongoing basis
- Looked at programs that could support youth in the community
- Willingness to work with justice-involved youth with importance given to family engagement and youth voice

 Convened a selection committee of 12 members from the community, HCJPD, and CHCS for initial application review (66 applications) and 10 interviews. 3 organizations were selected.

 Engaged in 2<sup>nd</sup> round of funding. 2<sup>nd</sup> round included ground visits to the impacted areas to locate organizations doing this work and through recommendations to identify 10 organizations for selection by HCJPD, OJS and CHCS. 3 organizations were selected.

### **Grantee Information Map**

#### Young People in Action

"Level-up Mentoring Program" is a 10-week continuous intervention mentoring program for 40 male and female youth ages 10-18 and their families. The program focuses on the "Triple P Pillars" of Parent engagement, Pastors and churches for mentors, and Principals for school engagement. The program uses "The Council of Boys and Girls Circle Curriculum" and focuses on the following areas: leadership and character development, enrichment and recreational activities, field trips and learning retreats, various pro social activities, and other wraparound services. This program is available on a case-by-case basis to youth with at risk behaviors in the 77338, 77396, 77373, 77429 zip codes.

#### Legends and Legacies Houston, Inc

"The Legends and Legacies Program" is a 40-week wrap-around case management support program for 30 male and female youth ages 10-18 and their families. Key areas include intensive wrap-around case management, weekly individual, and group sessions where youth can share through role playing and art exercises, mentoring, community support activities and monthly field trips and family events. The program aims to support youth and their families to receive culturally appropriate services within their community to enhance access to basic needs and education. Serving youth in the 77099, 77016 and 77072 zip codes

#### Houston reVision - "Youth Advisory Board"

This program empowers young people to share their thoughts on juvenile justice and develop valuable community engagement, advocacy, and leadership skills. The program also collaborates with HCJPD and Civic Heart leadership to provide feedback and recommendations. Members of this board will receive a \$15/hr stipend, and Houston reVision will administer the Sunny Day Fund to support the basic needs of youth in Harris County.

#### The Forgotten Third, Inc.

"R.E.S.E.T." (Relationships, Education, Skills Building, Employment/Entrepreneurship and Training) is a 40-week continuous community-based intervention program that serves 45 pre/post-adjudicated males ages 10 -18 and their families. R.E.S.E.T.'s goal is to reduce crime/violence and provide a second chance. The program aims to empower and equip young adults through a comprehensive public health approach of increased protective factors and supports to aid in positive youth development. The core components are screening and assessment, intensive wraparound case management, education and vocational certifications, job and entrepreneurship training, credible messenger mentorship and restorative justice. Serving youth in the 77084. 77095, 77433 and 77449 zip codes.

#### Workshop Houston

"Near Peer Youth Leadership and Employment Project" is a 49-week continuous hands-on daily educational program Mon. – Thur., for 40 male and female youth ages 11-16. Hosted at a specialized artistic studio in Third Ward, youth learn leadership and employment skills, access tools, materials, and instructions and are empowered to participate in rewarding projects in the Beat Shop, Style Shop, Media Shop, or the Dance Shop. Aside from daily restorative justice circles, other key areas are Creativity and Self Expression, Positive Relationships, Life Skills, Social Justice and Advocacy, Positive Reinforcement, Cultural Competence and Community Engagement. Serving youth in the 77004, 77021, 77033, 77051 and 77087 zip codes.

#### Talent Yield Coalition, Inc

"Youth Justice and Family Development-Newspaper Program" is a 40-week continuous hands-on daily life skills intervention program for 50 male and female youth ages 10-17 and their families. The youth in the program, hosted at 5 campuses (Cedar Bayou J.H., Highlands J.H., Lee H.S., Goose Creek Memorial H.S., and The Point), will publicize a quarterly newspaper: completing the reporting, photography, editing and layout. This program will also provide comprehensive holistic supportive and expanded (wraparound) services for the youth and their families. The youth will participate in a life skills curriculum that focuses on communication, critical thinking, time management, decision making and negotiation skills. Talent Yield will also offer an "Expanded Program" to 25 male and female youth ages 10-17 and their families in Crosby, Channelview and Galena Park/North Shore areas and will offer the same wraparound case management services that is offered in the "Newspaper Program". Serving youth in the 77532, 77562, 77044, 77530, 77339, 77015, 77049, 77520, 77521 zip codes.

#### My Chapel

"The Champion and Victory Mentoring Program" is a continuous mentoring and wrap-around case management support program for 30 youth ages 10-18 and their families. Key areas include intake assessment, coordination with HCJPD, exposure to arts and music, "Pro Dad" curriculum, and mentor matching. The program aims to support youth and their families to receive culturally appropriate services within their community to enhance access to basic needs and education. Serving youth in the 77502, 77503, 77504, 77505, 77506, 77571 and 77536 zip codes.
