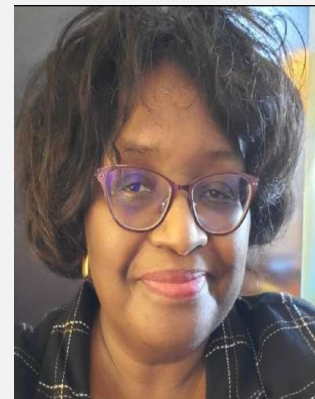

4-H and Member Definition



“All youth programming in Extension is by definition 4-H and that the preferred name for Extension Youth Development Programming is 4-H Youth Development”. - ECOP, March 2018

“A 4-H Member is a youth who participates in any educational program or activity delivered by Cooperative Extension and/or receives Cooperative Extension-based curriculum. 4-H Member includes a youth who is ‘Individually Enrolled’ or ‘Group Enrolled’, regardless of the type of 4-H engagement/delivery method in which they are participating”. - PLWG, June 2019

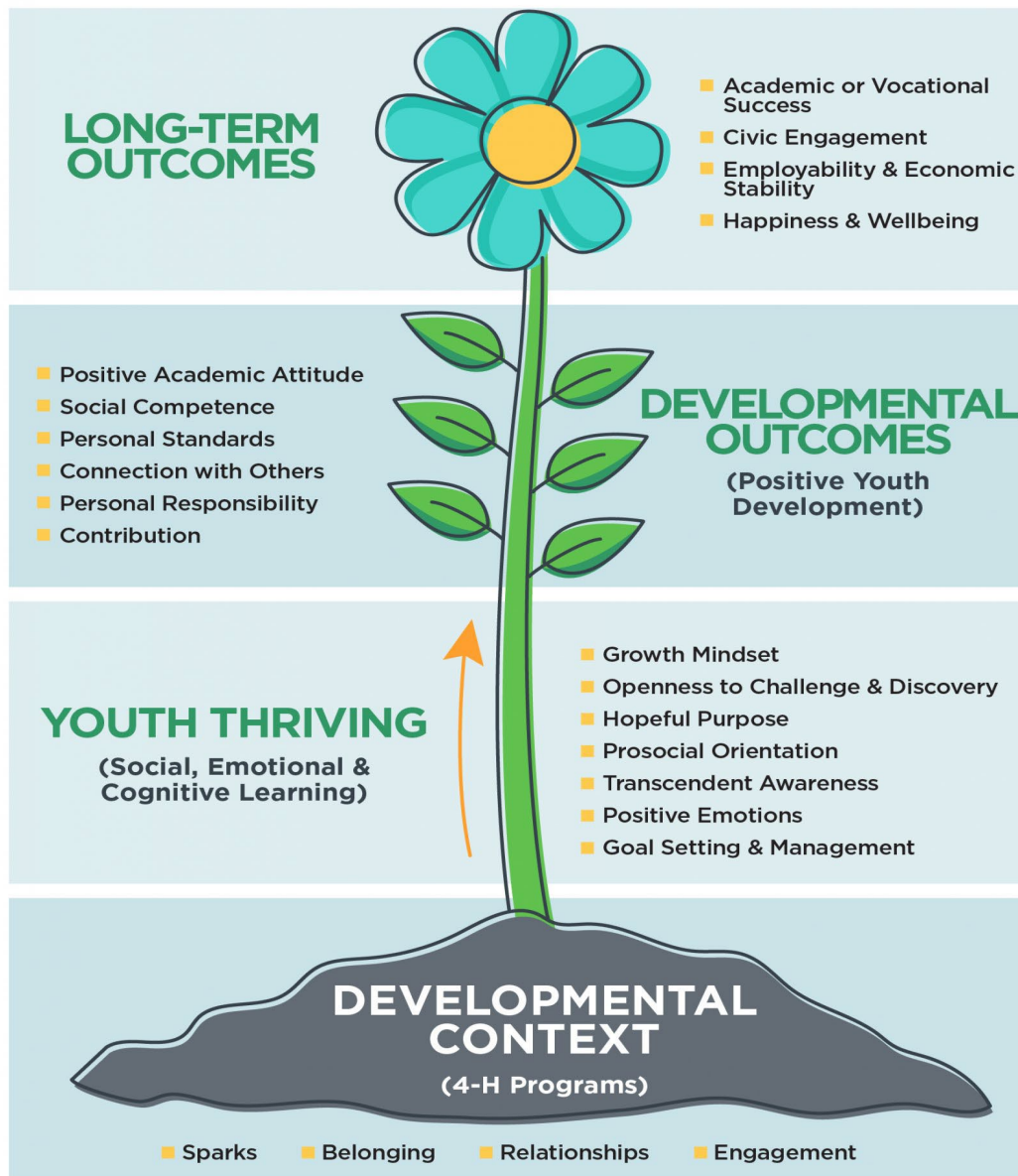

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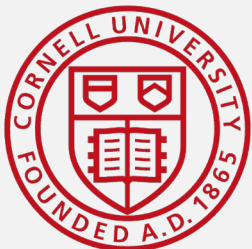
